Reflection – Something to Celebrate! Rev Jane Frost (Marldon)

I don't know about you but I've been thirsty for the Spring to arrive this year.

Daily dog walking around local lanes near the village where I live has allowed

me to catch repeated, promising glimpses of those small seasonal shifts:

unfurling January snowdrops; pussy willow about to burst out of brown casing; budding February daffodils and primroses. By the time this article is printed, nature will no doubt be in full March throttle and the lengthening daylight will be even more evident. At this time of year, whatever our circumstances, it can feel good to be alive! That's something to celebrate.

Perhaps like me, you also have cause to celebrate that we live in such a communities as we do. In Marldon, the village shops and local primary school breathe life into our daily rhythms. The Village Hall, managed by volunteers, is a hub for village groups; the Pre-school who are rightly thrilled by their 'Good' Ofsted report; the weekly Toddler gathering which the church has 'birthed'. The Community Choir and annual Panto group also find a home there. The Welsh in our midst will no doubt be celebrating St David's day at the beginning of this month. This year, that particular date in the Church's calendar also falls part way through Lent – a season of Paradox. Its Ash Wednesday threshold struck an austere note back in February. Given Lent's 40 days are also identified with the period Jesus spent in the wilderness before his short, earthly ministry began, for some, it will still be a time of self-denial and soul-searching: an opportunity to have a spiritual spring clean. Not very celebratory in flavour then, given, historically, people would have eaten up the last of the rich foods like eggs on Shrove Tuesday?

But looking at it another way, though, here is a period, in a season of burgeoning natural growth, to discover our own metaphorical growth points; to exercise our freedom to be who and what we are intended to be. The season of Lent in the church calendar prepares us for the events of Holy Week when we remember again how Jesus was put to death, like a criminal, in an apparently terrible fall from grace with the authorities, only to be raised from the dead on Easter Day so that all might have life in and through him: a life which has the potential to release the seeds of self-transformation, hope, human flourishing - something to celebrate, indeed.

Adopt a grave and sow new life

Would you like to adopt a neglected kerbed grave in Bridgetown Churchyard and create a mini wildflower meadow in it? Carolyn Stilwell can provide the wildflower seeds and some yellow rattle seeds. The churchyard is open from dawn till dusk, and any nice day from now till April would be a good time to plant. It will probably be more successful in a sunny spot than a shady spot. You need to create a fine top layer of soil to sow the seeds, so any existing vegetation needs to be cleared. Yellow rattle is parasitic to grass, so will stop grass from growing, giving a mini wildflower meadow a much better chance of establishing. Scatter the seeds then rake the soil and walk back over the area so that the seeds contact the soil. From experience it only takes an hour or two to plant a small, kerbed grave.

Please could you let Carolyn know which grave they have picked so she can make sure nobody else picks the same one! This is an ongoing project. THANKS to seventeen people who have already adopted graves. <u>cas273@yahoo.co.uk</u>

Latest News from St Mary's Reordering Project

Having got the faculty for most of our planned works we have now also been given the green light to proceed to a full application to the Lottery Heritage Fund. Despite several cost cutting measures due to escalating costs, we are still looking at a total project of £1.6 million, and are asking the LHF for

£960,000, so it is a big ask. There are no guarantees because there are lots of other organisations bidding for heritage funding, but the fact that we have got this far is a big tribute to all those who have worked on the project, past and present. The deadline for submission is Feb 29th and we'll know the outcome in June, so please pray that the bid will be received well. We will still need to secure another £275,000 of match funding, so will be going flat out on that in the meantime. For updates on the project you can visit the project website or facebook page:

Statement on Haberton Parish and the Totnes Benefice – Fr. Jim Barlow

The possibility that Harberton parish might join our team has been in the air for a while now and has reached the stage of formal consultation on the move (which requires what is known as a pastoral measure, details below). The reasons are set out in the measure, and I've given the relevant part below. We already have very good links with Harberton residents, and their centre of gravity is definitely more inclined towards Totnes and Dartington. I think this will strengthen the team, as we continue to explore the path of focal ministry. Given that we have one of the largest teams of ordained and licensed ministers in the Diocese, I do not forsee there being a capacity issue and Harberton are keen to align with our approach, including lay led services at least once a month. If the measure goes through, I look forward to welcoming them into the Team.

'The Diocesan Mission and Pastoral Committee has prepared a draft Pastoral Scheme, following a formal request by Harberton parochial church council, for the transfer of its parish from the benefice of Diptford with North Huish, Ermington, Halwell, Harberton, Harbertonford, Moreleigh and Ugborough to the benefice of Totnes with Bridgetown, Berry Pomeroy, Dartington, Marldon, Ashprington, Cornworthy and Stoke Gabriel in the diocese of Exeter where it shall continue distinct and for the consequential amendment of benefice names and patronage. The Harberton PCC has requested a transfer of benefice principally for geographical reasons, in that the resident community in Harberton generally identifies with the adjacent town of Totnes as its local centre, looking to it for most practical purposes rather than to the communities to the south and west with which the ecclesiastical parish is currently linked. Moreover, during the past ten years the position of Harberton within the benefice centred on Diptford (the Three Rivers Mission Community) has become more marginal with the extension of the Three Rivers benefice in the lvybridge direction and the resulting westward shift in its centre of gravity. It is considered that the mission and ministry of the church in Harberton would be best served if the parish were part of a mission community following more closely the natural lines of civic community life than is the case at present, and at the same time that increased capacity for the incumbent of Diptford etc. and a more cohesive shape for that benefice will facilitate the mission and service of the remaining parish churches in the Three Rivers Mission Community. A copy of the draft Scheme may be inspected at the parish churches in either benefice, with details of how representations can be made to the church Commissioners, if so desired.'

Anne of York 1439-1476, Duchess of Exeter, Lady of Dartington Hall



Who was she, this beautiful, pious lady who died so tragically in an upper bedchamber in Dartington Hall age only 36? Anne was the elder sister of King Edward IV. She was married aged 8 to Henry Holland, Duke of Exeter who owned Dartington Hall and huge estates, a very feisty man, seldom in residence here. She was divorced from him in 1472, their only daughter Anne Holland dying soon after. She had charge of his estates and household here.

Anne married Sir Thomas St Leger, Edward IV's Controller of the Royal Mint. Her second baby Anne St Leger was born on January 14, 1476. She was so weakened she gave her last breath a few days later. She was taken in her wood coffin bearing the York banner to Medieval St Mary's church behind the Hall and four candles were lit. When morning came staff lined up in silence around our courtyard to pay their respects as the horse drawn hearse carried her down the lower drive and along the River Dart path. Fr Thomas Wylle OSB, our priest from St Dogmael's Abbey followed on foot. The Prior of St Mary's Priory met them at St Peter's Quay, giving her his blessing. About ten days later she arrived by boat at Syon Abbey on the River Thames near Richmond Palace. Anne was patron of about 10 Devon nuns and priests there. She was taken to the great church and the Bridgettine community sang her Requiem Mass. On February 1 she was buried in St George's Chapel, Windsor Castle. She lies in the Rutland Chapel with her daughter Anne St Leger, Duchess of Joy Hanson, former gardener Syon Abbey Marley House Rutland.
