

Floating Art comes to the Dart!

"The Melt" is a high profile art project coming to the Dart this summer. It takes art out of the refined confines of a gallery and directly to our landscape, making it available to a much wider set of people. The Melt also invites us to



consider the difficult topic of our changing environment, which will only become increasingly more apparent.

This spring English sailor Ella Hibbert will attempt to become the first person to solo circumnavigate the Arctic by sailing boat (a 38' ketch), and the first person to do so non-stop, how she says that this "....is less about setting new world records and more about raising awareness of the increasingly rapid decline of the Arctic sea ice, and the repercussions this has



on the wildlife that live there – and on the world as a whole" (her Facebook page is called "Ella in the Arctic")

As Ella journeys she will be sending local Devon artist Anthony Garratt pictures of the icebergs she encounters. From these he will then paint a series of giant canvasses, 5m long and 2.5m tall.

These canvases will be mounted on platforms which will be floated first on the Dart (from mid June to sometime in August), then they migrate to the Teign and Exe (August to September). They will be moored so that when the tides change they will swing round to show different view. On the Dart the ferries will include them in their announcements, as will GWR when the platforms move on.


Of course there is consultation and support from the harbourmaster, and so far some potential sites are near Stoke Gabriel, near Sharpham, Higher Noss, and Dartmouth Town—so there should be plenty of opportunities for us to get a chance to experience this. Also look out nearer the time for complimentary events with

artworks on display, film screenings, and a talk by the artist and other guests.

There is a crowdfunder to help to support The Melt. Original oil painting and prints (50 x 40 cm) are available, brilliant in their own right, they also represent a permanent reminder of what is bound to be a highly memorable event, and each purchase helps to cover the build cost for the project. So far there is enough for two platforms, but the aim is for four.

Statement from the House of Bishops on the war in Gaza 13/02/2024

House of Bishops makes call for immediate ceasefire and release of hostages

With the onset of Israel's ground offensive into Rafah, we call for an immediate ceasefire. The relentless bombardment of Gaza and its huge cost in civilian lives and civilian infrastructure must stop. The manner in which this war is being prosecuted cannot be morally justified.

We urge Israel to adhere to the ICJ order and to ensure that Palestinians have access to food, water, healthcare, and safety, that have long been denied to them. We welcome the Foreign Secretary's recent call for an immediate pause in the fighting and would also welcome further representation to the Government of Israel about the way that it is exercising its right to self-defence and to affirm adherence to international law.

We continue to advocate for the release of the remaining hostages and an end to the missile attacks on Israel by Hamas. All sides must begin to imagine a future beyond this conflict for a just peace for Israelis and Palestinians. This war can't result in the consolidation of a system of occupation that has for too long denied Palestinians their rights and freedoms.

As we consider the impact of the current conflict in the Middle East on community relations here in the UK, we again condemn all antisemitic and anti-Muslim sentiment. We are horrified by the growing threats and abuses of Jews on university campuses, in our neighbourhoods, and online. We appeal to our communities to be safe for all people whatever their nationality, ethnicity or religion. For our own part, we commit to working alongside our fellow faith leaders for the common good, despite and with our differences.



The House of Bishops (General Synod of the Church of England)

The House of Bishops is one of three Houses that make up the General Synod. The House of Bishops led by The Archbishop of Canterbury and comprising more than 50 Bishops of the Church of England meets twice a year to discuss issues such as ministry, mission and national issues that affect the Church.

What does the word Lent mean?

The word "Lent" comes from the old English, "lencten," which means "spring." In Middle English is derived the words, lenten, lente, lent; related to the Dutch, lente, the German, Lenz, also meaning "spring." In Old German lenzin, lengizin, and lenzo are related words, which probably comes from the same root as "long" and referring to "the lengthening days," as the earth moves from the winter solstice toward the spring equinox.

So much to be found in a small word and so many other words written about it. With Easter in mind please read and enjoy the piece from our late Cliff Berdinner dug from the archive 2016. Loving God, your Son, Jesus, calmed the storm that frightened the disciples. You keep us safe too, even when we are afraid. Show us how to follow you, and help us to be there for one another. Teach us to share whatever we have fairly so that we, and our whole global family, may look to the future with hope. Amen.

Lent is a time of penitence, of turning to Christ and choosing once again to follow him. We go into the desert, to find time and space with God, and to face all that would distract us from his love. Pope Francis describes Lent as a season of grace, a time of conversion. Conversion is not solely a one-off event, but a lifetime of choices, and turning. In this season, may our conversion to Christ be renewed, may we open ourselves to his revelation and to his message of freedom: 'For freedom Christ has set us free ... do not submit again to the yoke of slavery.' It's just a thought: from the late Rev'd. Cliff Berdinner.

Hello again, here's a funny story about a parrot. Roger, the parrot, was being very abusive to his mistress, swearing and calling her names. So she said, 'If you don't behave better I shall put you in the freezer to cool off'. But nothing changed, so in the freezer Roger had to go. After five minutes his mistress took him out and Roger stopped swearing and saying bad things. 'That's better Roger', she said, to which the parrot replied, 'There's a chicken in there, he does look poorly, what did he do'?

This little story is interesting because what the mistress did represents a universal human phenomenon that when someone is guilty of an offence that someone deserves to be punished.

There is generally a feeling of rightness about this. We call it, justice, and it is the way a society endeavours to maintain order, fairness and security. Hopefully, today, justice is done with sensitivity and understanding.

This principle of punishment for the wrong doer is frequently found in our Bible. In the Old Testament God is portrayed as a judge and a Law God whose love for his chosen people is conditional upon their total obedience. Anyone breaking God's law was in for a bit of punishment. But there was little sensitivity or mercy here for the adulterer, the thief or a rebellious son who could be stoned to death. God's conditional love became Jewish orthodoxy which not only controlled the way they lived their lives but also who was allowed to worship - and ladies, even wearing trousers were forbidden!

In the New Testament God is generally thought of in a different way, as a God of grace and mercy which is clearly demonstrated in the ministry of Jesus, but the old Jewish idea of a God of rewards and punishment lingered on and found its way into the church creeds. The teaching about God's judgment and Heaven and Hell reached its height in the Middle Ages where getting to Heaven was dependent upon keeping all the rules, although I think the giving of a few indulgences may have stopped Hell from getting too full.

The idea of God's love as conditional is still with us today especially in the idea of the Last Judgement with its everlasting consequences. This has often troubled people, even frightened them and caused some folk anxiety about loved ones who have passed on.

But In our later conception of God we are coming much more to understand God's love as perfect and unconditional. I think this is the true meaning of 'Grace'. Perhaps it is a concept of God's love that is beyond our ability to fully understand because it is so completely contrary to our natural desire for compensation. A mother's love for her child is perhaps the nearest love that never seeks a reward. But others too have loved wastefully, as one writer puts it, and supremely we see this in ministry of Jesus Himself.

God's love without requirements is not some sentimental romantic notion but an understanding that God does not love us for our performance, either good or bad, but simply because God is love. And that love is around us and within us whoever we are and wherever we go; neither is it for some but not others.

To allow into our consciousness this understanding that we are loved and not judged, is our resurrection, now, in this life. I am sure that such love can but draw out our own love for God,

CrownleyWoods - our precious CommunityWood

Crownley Wood, opposite The Maltsters Arms, was purchased by a combined effort of about 35 villagers from Tuckenhay, Ashprington and Cornworthy and donated to the NationalTrust in 1990 under the energetic leadership of Anthony Harrison.

Originally access was by boat only. But thanks to the then footpath warden Laurence Green and owners Peter and Liz Mantle there is a "permissive path" over their field from the Sewage Works, just below Ashprington on the road down to Bow Bridge. This beautiful wood is open to anyone to walk in or have a picnic or barbecue under the shelter where there is a fire grate, table and seats.

Every year we try to arrange two work parties in the Spring and Autumn to help with any job the National Trust wants done such as pathway clearing, maintenance of the steps, etc.



Ski Harrison is the local link with the National Trust and is in contact with Richard Snow of the National Trust to arrange a Saturday in March or April for a work party. The days are always good fun with a community picnic lunch under the shelter.

Millpond Junction toad patrol 2024

This year to date a great band of volunteers have managed to rescue over 400 toads, over 50 newts and a few frogs. The migration is possibly not yet over as weather patterns this year have been unusual and have possibly confused our amphibian friends!

There have been lower numbers this year so far, around half of last year's result. Collecting data for Froglife is crucial and there are 803 groups around the country doing the same thing. This is helping to gather information for the national scientific database, monitoring species behaviour.

Ponies arrive at Sharpham to assist rewilding

Two ponies have arrived on The Sharpham Estate to help with rewilding. The Konik ponies are mimicking wild horses that roamed the lands thousands of years ago, nibbling and browsing vegetation and keeping a check on plant growth naturally. The ponies join Belted Galloways and Mangalitza pigs as part of a National Lottery Heritage Fund projectWild For People – restoring nature on former farmland near Totnes, South Devon.



How do grazers help rewilding?

Our landscape evolved with the help of the animals that lived within it. Ancient livestock shaped the land by eating plants, fertilsing and disturbing the land.Wild boar that used to inhabit Britain turned over the soil seeking tasty roots to eat – simultaneously enabling plants to seed easily and therefore adapting the land. Aurochs (a now-extinct type of ancient cow) and Tarpans, ancient wild horses, browsed and nibbled on brambles, shoots, samplings and shrubby vegetation. By doing so, they acted as 'nature's pruners', preventing certain plants from dominating and allowing space for other species to thrive. The grazers' manure naturally fertilised the ground, ensuring soil-health & food for insects. Those insects were food for birds and small mammals, which were food for larger prey, weaving a rich 'tapestry' of nature. By bringing in modern-day equivalents to ancient grazers, rewilding at Sharpham gets an enormous boost.Konik ponies are from Poland and are descendants of very hardy Eastern European ponies.

These two are called Sylvi and Stella and have been donated to Ambios by Wildwood - a native species conservation charity, with visitor nature parks in Devon and Kent. The ponies are both 15 years old and have spent their lives grazing on nature conservation projects in the UK.

How passers-by can support the ponies:

The rewilding fields run either side of a permissive path linking Totnes to Ashprington, frequented by walkers, cyclists and dogwalkers.Passers-by can support the charity's rewilding efforts by not entering the fields and by keeping dogs on leads and out of the fields too. **People should NOT feed the ponies as this will disrupt their digestive systems.**

Pony power will help rewilding:

"We are delighted – this has been a long time coming – 4 years in the making, and actually it feels like bringing wild ponies back to these lands is connecting with our ancient ancestors, and with natural landscapes from centuries ago," said Jack Skuse, rewilder and Ambios director. "The addition of ponies will have a major impact on the structural diversity of the vegetation – grazing the tall grasses and woody hedgerows plants – which in turn encourages greater biodiversity. This will offer vital, missing habitat for wildlife. For example, horses wallow in dry, sandy patches, which support insects who need these small sandy patches for breeding. Their addition will, we hope, support nature recovery at Sharpham, and bring missing wildlife back"

Sharpham Trust Director Julian Carnell said that rewilding The Sharpham Estate illustrated the charity's ethos perfectly -



whilst highlighting the need to support nature wherever possible. "We want to make a more mindful and sustainable world and we're doing our bit at Sharpham," he said. "The project is called Wild for People because we recognise that rewilding has to involve people and connect them back to the land.

"When people are connected to nature, they're much less likely to want to harm it so if we can do that at the same time as supporting biodiversity, then that's a real win-win". Around 1500 people a year come from all over the UK to stay on mindfulness retreats at The Sharpham Trust. Each retreat incorporates nature-connection techniques and retreat-participants can access the rewilding land to witness the flora and fauna there.

Soon we shall have many more bird nesting boxes and bat boxes as a result of the workshop planned for the 7th of April. Do come for a walk on the mown (by Nigel D) path at the back of the church and if you would like to help in any way with graveyard gardening please let us know.

Our Ash Wednesday service was taken by Rev'd. Chris Harris and was followed by a bread and soup lunch with donations going to Shelterbox to provide a substantial tent to house a family who have been deprived of everything by war or natural or man-made disasters.

Our patronal festival for St David's Day will take place on March 3rd, the nearest Sunday to March 1st. St David's flag, not the Welsh dragon but a yellow cross on a black background, will fly for a week from the church tower (weather permitting) before being replaced by the horizontal yellow and blue.

The second Sunday in February, normally Village Worship, was a Community Gathering on the theme of looking after each other in love taken by Chris Grimshaw. It was stimulating and well attended. The second event on this theme will take place on the second Sunday in April with a bring and share lunch in church. There will be a special service for Mothering Sunday on the second Sunday in March led by David Davies. This will be a very special service of music and readings with activities for children. We thank the dedicated people who plan and deliver these stimulating services which not only praise God but make us think about what we can all do. *Laurence Green*

Maintenance-who does it?

Dittisham Parish Council is responsible for maintaining the following areas in the Parish: The Ham and the Ham carpark; Ham Lane and the Ham 'Triangle'; The Level carpark and The Old Chapel burial ground.

Every three years the grounds maintenance contract has to be put out to tender to ensure that the PC is getting 'value for money'. Several companies submitted quotes and at the PC meeting in December 2023 'It was unanimously resolved to accept the least costly quote of £3,511.31 for the next grounds maintenance contract'

The PC maintenance working group were pleased that the grounds maintenance contract was secured by South Hams District Council as their grounds maintenance team were the contractors from 2021 - 2023.

The most obvious area of maintenance is The Ham – the main grass area and surrounds are cut twice a month from March to October, but 2023 was challenging. March was so wet that the first cut was at the start of $\frac{1}{2}$

April, as the grass was quite long, the team removed the cut grass (or arisings, as they are called) which they wouldn't normally do. They also did the same in May, in time for the Coronation Celebrations. June was so dry the grass didn't grow very much so the first cut in July was not needed.

All went to plan until the rains came and the Ham was either too wet or frozen for any grass cutting in October, November or December. The team finally managed to do the job early in January! Strimming the verges and banks; trimming the hedges and trees and keeping the gullys clear are also part of the contractors' work – the PC are very pleased with the results and we know you are too from the compliments we receive!

As you may know – we have 3 defibrillator machines in the parish: Cornworthy village hall, East Cornworthy postbox, Allaleigh central – entrance to Stone Barn. We also have a group of volunteers who have been trained to deliver chest compressions and use a defibrillator if someone in the parish has a cardiac arrest. If you or someone with you is having a cardiac arrest, dial 999. Then call 01803 501019 to get a local volunteer to come to your home with a defibrillator.



We are developing maps of the parish, with every property marked to help volunteers reach you quickly. We are also using a location identification system called what3words to help to identify your location. This system creates a unique reference to pinpoint a 3m by 3m square area, and importantly, does not require a mobile signal.

We have automatically generated the what3words for your location, based on the latitude and longitude of your property, but would like you to have the opportunity to amend the 3 words. To check yours:

1. Visit <u>https://cornworthyparishcouncil.gov.uk/vets-defibs/</u>on the Cornworthy parish council website, and find your property name on the lists for Cornworthy village, East Cornworthy or Allaleigh area. Make a note of the what3words reference for your house, or copy it directly from the webpage.

2. Go to 'www.what3words.com' (on the web, or download the app to a smartphone) Enter the 3 words reference (or paste it) and it should identify your house. Happy with that? Fine. Want to suggest a change to the what3words reference? Click on the form provided in the CPC website to make a change. You might want to suggest a change towards your gateway, entrance or front door to help the volunteer who comes to your house.

If you are familiar with what3words, but know a neighbour or friend in the village who is not, please help them. If you are not familiar with what3words yourself, please ask a friend or neighbour to help you. We would like to launch the maps along with the updated what3words asap, so please make any amendments before 31st March. Thanks for your help! *TheV.E. T.S. defibrillator team.*

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DRIVING UP INVESTMENT

Predicting future values of any commodity is the key to wise investments and the classic car world is as hard as any to read ahead. However, there is a pattern in previous surges in value which cannot be ignored.

The correlation between price peaks and the passage of time is unmistakable and the upward curve tends to start around the 25 years old mark, peaking around 35 years and starting to tail off after about 45 years. This is due to several factors which drive values. There is the 'My Dad Had One of Those' and also an aspirational desire for nostalgic reasons. For example, poster cars that teenagers yearned for or remember being driven in when young. Now in middle age and with disposable income, they can afford to indulge in their dream car.

This explains why 55 years old classics like the Lotus Cortina are no longer where they used to be and 1950s gems like Bristol, Alvis and Riley can be snapped up for a fraction of their renovation costs. The buyers simply do not remember them and hold no memorable love for them. A further spike occurs after the 60 years point as bearded gentlemen of a certain age indulge their retirement funds into 'Man Cave' projects. Of course, there are exceptions and rule breakers like the James Bond Aston Martin DB5, Jaguar EType and Ferraris which are in a special league of their own.

The last two years have seen price drops across the board however, due to high interest rates, the cost of living and high energy costs all playing their part. But we are at the start of a new season for classics which traditionally bounce back after winter. Examples that are emerging now with potential growth include the Aston Martin DB7, Bentley Arnage, M series BMWs and Japanese hot rods such as Nissan Skyline, Mitsubishi GTO and the Toyota Supra, all of which had huge appeal when new but

impossible price tags to their youthful admirers. It is now feasible to pick up any of this list substantially below £20,000 but which can almost certainly increase in time. I would never suggest one of these as your daily driver and suitable garaging space needs to be allocated. However, it is impossible not to have a huge amount of fun with any of the above and the 'Smiles per Mile' factor is immense even if you do not make a profit.

Current peaks are the 1980s hot hatches and Cosworth Fords plus the highly useable Mercedes SL from the late 1980s, as seen in TV's Dallas.

My top tip? The Italian thoroughbred Ferrari V8 powered 385bhp Maserati 4200GT with manual gearbox around £15000. This is Supercar territory for Mondeo money but be prepared to have it serviced by specialists. www.jollycars.co.ukTel:01803732211 email:pauljollycars@gmail.com



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
