#### Grave Gaffes and Monumental Mistakes.

#### **Part One: Corrected Errors**

During Victorian times and earlier, educational standards were not generally as high as today's. Even highly skilled craftsmen made mistakes which were, in reality, 'set in stone'. Sometimes they were able to correct them and set the record straight. Here are two examples:

#### The Buckingham Grave in St David's Churchyard

This beautiful slate grave marker dates from 1828. It is beautifully engraved and has, at the top, the winged head of an angel, a device common in earlier gravestones in New England. There are signs that the monumental mason's attention started to

wander about half way down the slate. The line of writing departs slightly from the horizontal, beginning to slant slightly.

When carving the details of Mrs Buckingham's husband who was lost at sea on a voyage home from Newfoundland the craftsman forgot that he was meant to be commemorating his wife. He began the line with 'He' instead of 'She' in a classic hanging predicate (when the subject in the second half of the sentence deviates from the original subject of the first half).

There was just room to carve an 'S' in front of the 'He' but the 'S' is smaller and not as confident. It was only by idly sitting on the bench under the holly tree opposite the gravestone that I noticed this correction.

#### Darre monument South Pool Church

The next correction is much older and less skilful. It is found on an Elizabethan monument in the south aisle

chapel of South Pool Church, near Kingsbridge. The monument commemorated the Darre family and comprises a

descriptive tablet and statues of Leonard Darre, who died in 1615, and his wife Joan, who died in 1608. Beside Leonard are small statues of two kneeling sons. Beside his wife are similar images of three daughters.

Unfortunately the monumental mason got the numbers of offspring wrong. On the plaque he carved 3 sons and 2 daughters. When he realised his mistake, he superimposed a '3' over the '2' which can still be made out. He added a curved tail on the bottom of the '2', crudely changing it into a '3'. Economics dictated that he should leave the changes in place rather than scrap the plaque and begin again!



Many people have visited St David's Church this month and enjoyed the peace of the church building and the churchyard as well as the views over the village and the beautiful countryside of the South Hams. Our varied services have been well attended on the whole and many people have expressed enthusiasm for the condition of the church and its surroundings. September 3rd is not only the day this country declared war on Nazi Germany but also Merchant Navy Day. To mark the occasion and to remember the many thousands of sailors lost in the wars we have a short and simple ceremony each year at the Lychgate at 10:00 am on that day. A poem, a reflection and a few prayers are said before the Red Ensign is flown for a week from the flagpole at the top of the tower. Then the rather tattered Ukrainian flag will go back up to remind us of the continuous injustice and atrocities of the Russian attack on this proud nation. Next year I will drive a pickup truck from Stoke Gabriel to Poland and will be raising sponsorship to do this. It will be no great hardship because the roads in France, Belgium, Germany and Poland are better than many of the roads here. The road signs are wonderfully clear and, provided the truck doesn't break down, Ukraine will have another small piece of its infrastructure replaced.

With autumn round the corner and, as yet, no sign of the front of the churchyard being cut, the cremation plot has been tidied up. There are now only five large chunks of the oak tree left. Would anybody like them?

## Creativity and Conservation Bring a Lost Species Back to our Community:

## The River Gara Water Vole re-introduction project

During the weekend of August 10th and 11th, two local and internationally renowned artists opened their studios and invited the public to engage with thought-provoking artworks that highlight the epic decline and renewed hope for our local population of a much-loved and environmentally important species.

Gently peeling paper from a copper plate, Sarah Gillespie revealed the enchanting face of a water vole. Its thoughtful eyes tell the story of both the past and the future. The mezzotint process that Sarah uses dates back to a time when our landscape was home to countless water voles, which supported and thrived in a much richer habitat than we know today. However, their loss from our landscape, primarily due to habitat destruction and predation by non-native American mink, is now slowly being reversed by a local reintroduction project driven by a group of passionate volunteers.

Sarah invited the community to share in the process of printing a limited edition of water vole images that were sold

to raise funds for the River Gara Water Vole Reintroduction Project. The face looking out from the print expresses the deep connection between the artist and the natural world. From the experience of releasing voles and quietly observing them in their habitat to the time spent meticulously engraving every mark, Sarah's unique connection and commitment to this precious creature is tangible.

Just a few miles away, Frances Gynn also spent the weekend welcoming visitors to her studio. Fran created an enormous and stunning water vole montage masterpiece for a public erasure event, which was opened by Derek Gow, an inspirational speaker and lost species champion. Fran then invited her guests to erase these beautiful water vole drawings, one heartwrenching stroke at a time. The act of rubbing out the gorgeous graphite creatures reflected the catastrophic depletion we have caused this keystone species in the wild and was hard to witness.

The passion and generosity of these two remarkable women not only raised over £5,000 but also brought the community together to support the efforts of a small group of individuals.



Water voles are considered a keystone species, meaning they have a disproportionately positive effect on the ecosystem. By nibbling riverside vegetation, they create flower-rich banks with greatly increased plant diversity. This benefits numerous species, including bees, moths, butterflies, and other pollinators, and subsequently the mammals, birds, and bats that feed upon these insects.



The intricate cycle of nature also finds water voles themselves on the menu, and their presence supports magnificent predators such as otters, stoats, and herons. Water vole burrows also provide refuge and protected breeding sites for other small mammals, reptiles, and amphibians.

A grant from Farming in Protected Landscapes and the money raised during the open studios weekend will finance the next phase of the reintroduction project which takes place at the end of August and in the Spring of 2025.

When the final release is complete next year, the project will have put 800 water voles back into the River Gara, which flows down through a quiet valley to Slapton Ley so look out for them next time you are walking around the ley. *Victoria Benns*.

### **Our Motoring Correspondent**

Well, it didn't take long, did it?

New government, new broom, sweep clean, and blame the outgoing administration for all the cuts. By announcing these so soon after taking office makes it easier and more convincing to get away with distancing themselves from responsibility.

And no, I am not talking about the removal of the Winter Fuel Allowance for pensioners, but our very much needed road network improvements that have been in the making for decades.

You may remember the much heralded, Folkestone to Honiton Trunk Road improvements dating from 1946. I clearly remember roadside placards proudly advertising this upgrade. Given the European gateway Dover/Folkestone ports, it made sense for the West Country to be able to export fish/farm and other products via the shortest route possible along the South Coast.

Apart from a few bypasses such as Dorchester, Axminster, Charminster and half a bypass at Bridport, not much has been done to make this southern route viable, certainly not considering the size of intercontinental trucks today.

What we really needed as well as a South Coast trunk route was the A303 upgrade and dualling particularly from Amesbury to Mere which is the first single carriageway and proper bottleneck west of the M25. Controversial as it was, the Stonehenge tunnel had been years in the making and was finally going to happen until July 5th. Cancelled by our new government with all blame passed up elsewhere.

The Westcountry is only motorway accessible from the Capital and South East regions by the indirect M4/M5 via Bristol and we desperately needed the straight line A303 corridor to be upgraded and connected with the existing Honiton/Exeter A30 dual carriageway which opened in 1999. From Exeter onwards, there are excellent dual carriageways to Torbay, Plymouth and Cornwall.

Logic suggested the short, 20 mile dualling through the Blackdown Hills, from Ilchester to Honiton, which would then connect either section of existing dual carriageways suitable for HGVs. Once Stonehenge was complete, we would then have a viable and far shorter direct route to Devon and Cornwall lifting pressure off the M4/M5, particularly for holidaymakers, our bread and butter. Shorter journeys also use less fuel.

If large HGVs can be encouraged to take the shortest route to London, the South East and the Channel Tunnel, and why wouldn't they, the fuel savings are considerable. At just 10 mpg, these leviathans would use 3 gallons less diesel each way since the A303 route is 36 miles shorter than the M5/M4 to the M25 London Orbital. But time is money so they use the fastest most reliable route which is of course much longer. Each return trip per HGV would potentially save 6 gallons of fossil fuel and incalculable amounts of Co2 emissions if this route were to become viable to the majority of commercial traffic.

In turn, the Bristol M4/M5 junction would ease its regular snarl-up and congestion thereby freeing up the South Wales to London/South East traffic and countless holidaymakers might have a nicer start to their West Country holiday.

Sometimes a bit of forward thinking is needed rather than the blame culture we have unfortunately witnessed. After all, some bright minded folk saw the future needs of our region back as long ago as 1946.



DRAFT Minutes of the Meeting of Cornworthy Parish Council

In Cornworthy Village Hall on Monday 22nd July at 7.30pm

Present: Cllr Tuppen (Chair), Cllr Bailey (Vice Chair), Cllr Fowler, Cllr Hammond, Cllr Finn Cllr Thompson, Cllr Hunt, Cllr McKay SHDC and Cllr Hawkins DCC were present as was C Campos Parish Clerk.

24/45 Declaration of Councillors Interest: the Clerk clarified that only a pecuniary interest in an item would restrict a Councillors' ability to discuss and vote on that item. However, she advised that any connection to an item should be declared for transparency. On that basis Cllrs Tuppen, Bailey, Fowler and Finn all declared an interest in item 15.

24/46 Approval of Minutes

The minutes of the Cornworthy Parish Council (CPC) meeting of 20th May 2024 were approved and are available on the CPC website. The minutes of the Annual Parish meeting held on 20th May were approved and are available on the CPC website

24/50.1 Correspondence A resident asked that overhanging trees on footpath 1b be cut back. The Clerk will write to the contractors for the Woodland Trust and ask that this is done.

24/51 Devon County Council Highways

The change of date for Road Closure-Washbourne Bridge Cross to Blackdown Cross, Blackawton was noted as changed to 1st August to 5th August 2024

24/52 Planning

24/52.2 Approval for application 1597/24/HHO was noted.

24/53 Finance

24/53.1The CPC Finance report was noted and is available on the CPC website.

24/54. Responses to recent communications with Neighbourhood Highways Officer

24/54.1 Cllr Hawkins requested that details of the signage issues in Allaleigh were sent to him for him to take up with DCC.

24/54.2The officers reply referred to a different set of drains. Cllr Hawkins recommended sending a further letter to include a senior Highways officer. Householders will be visited to ask them tidy up hedge trimmings etc to stop them blocking drains.

24/55 The Lengthsman will be asked to replace the rotting posts around the Village Green and reseed the grass with seed suitable for shady conditions.

24/56 The Clerk will investigate the contents, timing and date of the DCC Road Warden training scheme so that the Lengthsman and Councillors can consider attending.

24/57 It was agreed that the Village Hall is Cornworthy's best asset, and many residents enjoy using it. Evidence of Parish Council support is crucial for success with other grant applications. There will be enough grant funding available for other organisations and purposes. Therefore, it was agreed to give a grant of £1000 to the Village Hall subject to conditions set out in the Grants Policy which is on the CPC website.


