

DRAMA ON THE DART! Dittisham Village Hall plays host to a comedy thriller



So.... Was it the housekeeper in the library with the candlestick? Or the colonel in the drawing room with the kitchen scissors? Or how about the cook in the corridor with a revolver? A dangerous killer is on the loose in Bagshot House Country Hotel and we're soon going to be running out of body-bags. Only a very special someone can save the day - a detective of razor-sharp intelligence and dazzling intuition is required. Enter our old friend, Inspector Pratt...

Audiences from last year's super-successful touring production of Peter Gordon's hilarious crime spoof 'Murdered to Death', brought to Dittisham Village Hall by CampTheatre Company, are in for another treat this autumn. Its madcap follow-up, described above, is Secondary Cause of Death - and promises to be every bit as funny.

With more than a nod to 'Cluedo' in the script, there are also in-jokes a-plenty for Agatha Christie fans. 'Murdered to Death' featured mild-mannered elderly sleuth Joan Maple, a tongue-in-cheek homage to Christie's Miss Marple. In 'Secondary Cause of Death', Joan's bossy sister Cynthia is in charge of the

action, organising a Murder Mystery Evening for the hotel guests. 'Murder is never a game,' she barks crossly. 'Serious business!'

Bagshot House is snow-bound, which means the murderer is still on the premises – one of Agatha Christie's favourite setups. It's a classic party trick from the Golden Age of detective fiction – the 'Closed Room' tradition, where a crime takes place in a cut-off location that no one can escape from. (Then There Were None' and 'Evil Under the Sun'- were set on Burgh Island).

All of which means that the hapless Inspector Pratt definitely has his work cut out. What's more, it's 1939. Storm clouds are gathering over Europe, Bagshot House's guests include an army captain and a suspicious Polish count. And someone, somewhere, is up to no good with an exploding cigar.

This will be Camp Theatre Company's sixth visit to Dittisham, hosted as ever by the Ditsum Players. Founded in the Cornish village of Menheniot ('Camp' stands for 'Completely Amateur Menheniot Players'), the acclaimed community theatre company is now in its thirtieth year. 'Secondary Cause of Death' will be its seventieth production, and Director Steve Jefferies – reprising his role as Inspector Pratt – will be heading up a cast of nine, three of whom are new to the Company this year.

Excitement for the tour is already running high across the Tamar, with the run kicking off on 24 October in Menheniot itself. Dittisham, on 2 November, will be venue number four and - says Steve – it's always an especially popular stopover for the cast on account of its famously enthusiastic audiences and rather-longer-than-usual drinks interval ...

Does your book club fancy a little light reading to dovetail with a trip to the show? There's plenty of 'cosy crime' to choose from at the moment – with best-sellers rolling hot off the press from ex-Communard, the Reverend Richard Coles and everyone's favourite quiz host, Richard Osman. Or try Kate Atkinson's brilliant new novel, 'Death at the Sign of the Rook', which is set (you've guessed it) at a Murder Mystery Evening in a country house hotel. But, really, there's no need to do any homework before your visit. Just buy your ticket well in advance (it's sure to be another sell-out), take your seat and watch out for exploding cigars!

Clergy Letter

We Shall be Changed! Tony Gregg, Licensed Lay Minister

Joy of joys! After so much hard work and a great deal of effort, we learn that St. Mary's, Totnes has successfully been awarded a substantial Heritage Lottery Grant, which will help to make this glorious building a place "fit for purpose."

Huge congratulations to all those involved. We understand the plan is to close the building after Christmas for at least 6 months while work goes on, so no services or events will be possible in the building. This is going to mean very big changes, not the least that worship will have to be in other churches in ourTotnesTeam.

Change! This can be very worrying, indeed, even threatening for some people. In his book "Finding Stability in Times of Change" Richard Frost explores this in a very readable way, using the story of Jesus and the storm at sea as a reference point.

For me, this was doubly emphasised by an article I read very recently by Richard Rohr. He says this: "The inner process of change and growth is fundamental to everything, even our bodies." We see this in nature itself where changes occur in the seasons, in plant life, in human growth itself. This is the way that life perpetuates itself in ever-new forms; through various changes that can sometimes feel like death. And, of course, this pattern can be scary, though it is the very essence of Jesus' death and resurrection.

Religions tend to idealise and protect the status quo or the supposedly wonderful past. So often this is only to protect power and privilege. Richard Rohr writes, "We often worship old things as substitutes for eternal things." It is so easy to think of things as they were "back then"- you know- in the good old days of old - when God was really God, and everybody was happy and pure. Did they really ever exist?

Surely, this leaves the present moment empty and hopeless- not to speak of the future.

I believe that God goes on creating things from the inside out, so they are forever developing, growing, and changing. Our whole history is one of evolution and can be one of transformation.

Equally I believe that we have been given a Godsent opportunity at St. Mary's for regrowth and transformation. Think of this as a fallow period from which can come forth new shoots and blossoming.

I remember when Coventry Cathedral was reconsecrated it was likened to a phoenix rising from the ashes. My prayer is that St. Mary's may do the same.

Grave Gaffes and Monumental Mistakes. Part Two: Uncorrected Errors


To err is human, to forgive divine. I trust that the instigators of the following mistakes, 'set in stone' have been forgiven. They certainly make life interesting.



Rattery Churchyard War Memorial. In all fairness the extra 'L' was added to the correctly inscribed 'grateful' when it was repainted.




Grave in Holy Trinity Churchyard, Buckfastleigh. Is that really how you spell 'Belgium'?




Window in St David's Church, Ashprington . 'Ressurection'? Are you sure?

Simon Grierson 1945–2024.

Simon's death came as a severe shock. We thought he would be around for ever...

He lived in Ashprington for sixty years at The Wheelhouse, although the wheel fell to pieces many years ago. After leaving school he crewed yachts in the Mediterranean and the West Indies, returning home to look after his mother who suffered from rheumatoid arthritis from a young age. His father had left for Spain when Simon was quite young.

Simon was master of many trades: engineer, mechanic, boat builder, storeman, cook, sailor, gardener, house renovator, removals expert. He even helped remove the machinery from Tuckenhay Mill when it stopped the production of handmade paper.


He had a great interest in travel, maps, and history and an encyclopaedic memory. He witnessed two murders in Marseille and Monaco. His French was good and love of good company legendary. I remember going to his twenty-first birthday party.

A few years ago Simon had a triple heart bypass operation that prolonged his life but not his quality of living. He had many friends and was a very faithful and attentive friend. Having no interest in material gain and he lived simply but was extremely generous. He made no demands on anyone and was very grateful for any help as he grew older.

I am convinced that he knew that his life was coming to an end. He rewrote his will and had it signed and witnessed ten days before his death. Most relieved to have put his affairs in order, he had peace of mind during the days before his death.

Everyone who knew him was shocked that he had gone. He was an institution, staggering into the Village Hall on a Thursday morning with one eye closed against foul weather. I used to call him 'The Ancient Mariner'. He enjoyed good conversations with many people, revealing an impressive depth and breadth of knowledge on very many diverse subjects. One of the most unassuming and generous of men, he will be greatly missed for a very long time.

He requested a simple funeral in St David's Church and the launch of his ashes into the River Dart at Dartmouth. Simon's memorial service will be on the Saturday the 19th October at 2:00pm. Please don't come wearing dark colours. We shall be celebrating his remarkable life.





Autumn's early morning nip is upon us, and there's some key prep you can do in your gardens this autumn to help your local wildlife survive the ensuing winter.

Avoid the urge to cut back and tidy too much. It's more beneficial for nature to leave any decaying plants intact, as they create a cosy layer for garden mammals and insects to snuggle down in when winter hits. Hollowed stems and seedheads also provide a safe insect hidey-hole from frosts. If you have any dead wood in your autumn garden, or if you're already sweeping up rust coloured leaves, gather them into a pile in a corner of your green space – again insects and small mammals, including our struggling hedgehogs, will thank you for creating a snug home for them.

Look after your ivy. Ivy is an all-round winner for nature because its evergreen leaves offer crucial shelter for birds and insects even throughout the

colder months, when other natural cover is thinning out. The berries are a crucial, calorie-rich source of food for your feathered garden friends, just when they need that extra energy hit to enable them to maintain their body temperatures. If you do one thing this autumn, nurture and pay homage to your garden ivy.

Get in stocks of bird food. Nature's hedgerows are now studded with blackberries and other fruit – a veritable paradise to garden birds. Birds will always favour feeding directly from nature's pantry, so whilst food stocks are bountiful you will naturally see a drop in garden feeder visitations. However, do keep their food and water sources topped up, because as soon as temperatures drop and the berry crop dwindles, your favourite garden birds will be back to your feeders in abundance. They rely on your high-energy, high-fat winter food to fuel them through the colder months. Don't forget to clean them regularly.

Look after butterflies in the house. In the lead up to winter, you may spot a small, unmoving tortoiseshell butterfly or a peacock butterfly perched on the wall in a corner of a room. They have entered their winter dormant stage so leave them be. But if things heat up and you spot an early rising butterfly in your home between now and spring, follow Butterfly Conservation's guidance: catch the butterfly carefully and place it into a cardboard box or similar, in a cool place for half an hour or so to see if it will calm down. Once it has calmed down you might be able to gently encourage the sleepy butterfly out onto the wall or ceiling of an unheated room or building such as a shed, porch, garage or outhouse. *Just remember that the butterfly will need to be able to escape when it awakens in early spring.*





Please come and be wild about Cornworthy over a glass of something with us at a meeting 7th October at 6pm in the Village Hall We have had a great response to our postings and stall at the Flower & Produce Show so it's now time to take it forwards. We want to tell you more about what we have in mind but, more importantly, hear more from you as to what you think we could and should do.

It looks like a community composting project would be popular. But we would need a site. Recycling: the Council's collection scheme is really good. But if we get together we can easily and cheaply recycle many other things that the Council cannot take- medicine packaging for instance.

And how about a community library of tools where we can share those things we all need but only use once a in a blue moon?

What do you think of a community residential scheme for our fellow residents, the bees, the birds and the mammals? If we get together with tools, materials, a little guidance, and in a couple of hours we could produce enough nest boxes, hedge hog houses and bee skeps to make a real difference to them.

How can we improve the diversity of our local habitats, the woodlands and hedgerows? Well, we can start by mapping them to see what we have already got and help us to work out how to make it even better.

Monday 16th September 2024 at 7.30pm Present: Cllr Tuppen (Chair), Cllr Bailey (Vice Chair), Cllr Fowler, Cllr Finn Cllr Thompson, Cllr McKay SHDC and Cllr Hawkins DCC were present as was C Campos Parish Clerk.24/62 Matters Arising from the Minutes. The matter of overhanging trees on a public footpath has been resolved by the landowner. The CPC accounts spreadsheet has been updated to show S137 items and Defib/VETS expenditure . The meeting with the DCC Neighbourhood Highways Officer will take place on 18th September. A parishioner

query regarding responsibility for hedgerows was answered by Cllr Hawkins who confirmed that it was the landowner's responsibility to maintain them. However, both County and District Councillors undertook to see if there was any assistance for landowners trying to eradicate Himalayan Balsam and Water Hemlock and report back to the Clerk.CllrTuppen asked for clarification about which authority was responsible for which part of the street cleaning and drain clearing operations. Cllr McKay confirmed that the small sweeper that visits the village comes under SHDC. Cllr Hawkins confirmed that the big lane sweeper and drain sucker were both operated by DCC. The Clerk will write to ask when these vehicles will visit the parish next and report back. 24/64 PlanningApproval for application 2652/24/FUL was noted. 24/65 Finance 24/65.1 The CPC Finance report was noted and is available on the CPC website.24/65.3 It was noted that any further grant applications to CPC for 2024/25 should be submitted by November 2024

24/66 CPC is keen to be involved in the South Hams Festival and take advantage of the grant funding on offer. As the theme of the event is Climate Change and Biodiversity, the WAC representative will report back after attending the SHDC Symposium on the same topic 24/67 CPC will confirm that it is happy with the use of CornworthyVillage Hall as the parish polling station as part of the Statutory Review of Polling Districts and Places 2024 24/68 A date for the Village Tidy Up will be chosen and publicised on Facebook. It will fall around the end of October/early November most likely 9th November 24/69 It was decided that CPC will not join the DCC Road Warden Scheme. 24/70 CPC was delighted with its sponsorship of the Scarecrow Competition, with over 25 entries and a cost of less than £100. They wanted to pass on their thanks to all the entrants and to the judge who did an excellent job. 24/71 Reports24/71.1 Clerks and RFOThe Clerk's report was received. The draft budget for 2025/26 will be prepared during October and then shared with the Chair and Vice Chair24/71.2 Defibs and VETs – all Defibs are in working order. 24/71.3 P3 Issues with footpaths 2,7,9 and 13 were all resolved after a meeting with a DCC officer. He provided a number of new signs to replace existing signage across the parish. The emphasis for next year's surveys will be to identify stiles that can be replaced with the metal gates which will increase accessibility and reduce the maintenance liability in future. Glorious Goodwood lived up to its name this year at the Revival meeting, an annual celebration of all things to do with classic cars and the racing era up to 1966 when the circuit ceased car racing events.

I cannot recommend a visit more highly if you have never been and, despite the dreadful weather, this year was as spectacular an event as you will find on the European calendar. Indeed, as this picture shows, even the public car park hosts millions of pounds worth of classic automobiles simply parked up while their owners lap up the racing around the circuit. Period dress is de rigueur and the visitors fully embrace an earlier time and style, becoming part of the show.

This year, Goodwood became the permanent home for the famous Tyrrell shed. Legendary GP team owner KenTyrrell launched and ran his eponymous F1 racing team from a small shed in OckhamVillage, Surrey. It's been saved from demolition and now permanently resides next to the circuit. It was in this ex-military issue shed where the Tyrrell Racing Organisation built race cars including the World Championship winning cars for Jackie Stewart in 1969, 1971 and 1973. It was the sole factory building until 1976 and also produced the famous 6-wheeled F1Tyrrell car.

Only in Britain can you find a Knight of the Realm and a Duke to formally open an old shed. On the Sunday

morning of the Revival meeting, The Duke of Richmond, owner of Goodwood, and Sir Jackie Stewart, held an opening ceremony with ex Tyrrell race driver Martin Brundle, retired Tyrrell mechanics and other staff, together with members of the Tyrrell family in attendance. Never before will the shed have housed so many guests, keen to witness this unique event.

This was a very special moment for me personally as I had been a guest of the Tyrrell Team back in 1969 at Monza when Jackie Stewart won his first World Championship. To be reunited with so many of the Tyrrell family and others from that particularly significant race was highly memorable. And all because of an old wooden shed.

The squally rain showers created difficult racing conditions for all the drivers, remembering that it is hard enough just to keep these things on the track with little in the way of driver aids such as traction control or anti-lock brakes. Add to that steamed up windows and next to useless wipers with drivers wearing heavy overalls and cumbersome helmets. It's a wonder any meaningful racing actually occurred. But it did.

The star of the show for me was a certain Austin Healey 3000 which was outgunned by vastly more powerful Aston Martins, Ferraris, AC Cobras and EType Jaguars, yet which went





on to a remarkable 10th place out of 28 entrants in appalling rainstorms. The driver exhibited stunning sideways car control under utterly dreadful conditions with Aston Martins hounding every turn yet he kept it on the track despite the relentless pressure.

Classic cars like this Austin Healey are owned by all manner of enthusiasts up and down the country and this particular owner happens to live in one of our three parishes for good measure!

Golding, Green, Hawke, Neale, Pope and Unitt; DCC Cllr Hawkins and SHDC Cllr McKay. Apologies for absence received from Cllr Golding. Both Cllrs McKay and Hawkins had a lot to report – here are just a few items: The South Hams Festival is being planned for June / July 2025. The theme will be climate change and biodiversity. Matched funding up to £1000 can be claimed by the PC to put on a local event. If you have any ideas – let us know. One suggestion is to put forward the ongoing nature recovery project for the whole of the Ham area for inclusion at the festival. The National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) is still in consultation and SHDC will be appealing the suggestion that the housing formula indicates that 875 new houses per year need to be built in South Hams (up from 550). Both Cllrs were very aware of the need for social/rental housing for local residents. Renewable energy: SHDC will concentrate on encouraging PV's on all suitable buildings. Cllr Nightingale suggested that the planning department and conservation officers should produce a guide as to which approaches and solutions might be acceptable for owners of listed buildings or buildings in Conservation areas. This would be encouraging instead of prohibitive, mean that less time and effort are wasted, which can instead be focused on the already challenging task of upgrading our older properties. The site for the Dartmouth composting scheme will be in part of the car park at Jawbones. Several local organisations have agreed to be involved and there have been offers of volunteers who will be required to make it a viable project. DartmouthYouth Club will have to move from Ivy Lane (due to be sold by auction) and will be using the Ballroom in the Guildhall until such time as a new venue can be found. They have their sights on acquiring and developing the RNLI building on Coronation Park once the RNLI have moved to their new base near the Higher Ferry. Maintenance: This year there has been an issue with the Hemlock water dropwort which is especially prevalent around the gullies of The Ham. In the past it has been strimmed back before it goes to seed but SHDC, following issues raised in Totnes about the plant being very poisonous, would not allow their maintenance team to carry out this work. Therefore the plant has died back naturally. The PC consulted Ed Parr Ferris (Devon Wildlife Trust) and he has suggested that planting damp loving plants could help to limit the amount of HWD that grows. Yellow iris and purple loosestrife are just two of the plants that will be introduced to the area. The West Dart Bus is getting too old and unreliable and needs replacing. At a recent meeting of the volunteer drivers it was felt important to get a community view as to whether we should continue and if so how. It was resolved to set up a Working Group to consider what actions and responses could be taken in the Parish with regard to the West Dart bus. Cllr Hawke; Cllr Green and some residents will make up the group. Jubilee Steps Project - The PC has requested quotes for the railings and their installation. Ashprington Parish Council

Thursday September 5th 2024 at 7.30 pm held in Ashprington Village Hall. Matters arising: Highway Maintenance Community Fund.Cllrs Stocks and Thompson have now submitted a claim to DCC Letter from Meg Booth, Head of Highways at Devon County Council. Meg

Booth wrote to the Parish Council concerning the withdrawal of the gritting service for the parish. The contents were discussed and it was agreed that the Clerk should respond pointing out the considerable amount of effort the parish has undertaken to try and keep access open to the gritter. She did offer to arrange for additional Civil Parking Enforcement in the autumn. Cllr Hawkins offered to write to Meg Booth on behalf of the parish asking that the service be resumed in the winter due to the efforts the parish has made. VAT and Storage Container. The Clerk was asked whether VAT would be recoverable on the purchase of the container – the Clerk confirmed it would. The Ash Meadow group will have expenditure on new railway sleepers. It was suggested that Cllr. McKay might grant up to £500 towards the cost and that Ash Meadow could explore the possibility of funding from the Rural Income Prosperity Fund. Gov. uk Domain. Parish Councils have received advice that they should apply for Domain. uk status. Grants of £100 plus VAT might be available for until February 2025. Over 500 councils have already applied. The advantages are said to be Legitimacy, Cyber Security and control. Cllr Paterson agreed to look into it. Repair/Remedial work to the Tuckenhay Bus Shelter and War Memorial Cllr Stocks queried when the work on the above might be completed. The Chair confirmed that now that the summer is over, there will be time for the work to be completed under the direction of himself and Cllr. Throgmorton. It was not deemed necessary to employ contractors to carry out the work. The verge just above Crownley Woods needs attention and the Chair requested that Cllr Green and Cllr Greaves might help. Cllr Paterson was asked to check out whether Sustainable Ashpringtonmight assist with planting wild flowers. Tree in The Cemetery A tree in the cemetery planted in lieu of a headstone is causing concern due to the spread of its roots affecting nearby graves. It was agreed that the tree needed to be pruned to prevent any more dam

District Cllr report Cllr McKay reported on a number of initiatives undertaken by SHDC. These include; attempts to take over the Cider Press Centre to turn it into a showcase for local produce. SHDC are supporting attempts to assist Schumacher College through its current problems. Attempts to create artisan workshops at the old Carpenter Oak Site. Supporting the South Hams Festival. Administering a Green Fund to help Biodiversity. NPPF Consultation . A statutory Government instruction to build 850 houses up from 550. Supporting South Brent Woodland Project funded by DEFRA. Housing Support Fund has been extended . Attempts made to revitalise the South Hams Markets including Totnes. Planning: 1915/24/HHO East Perchwood. Application for side and rear extension to existing dwelling and alterations to parking area. Conditional Approval1993/24/ARC Steps Cottage. Application for Removal of Details. Dischage of Condition Approved. 1822/24/CLE Coombe Park. Certificate of Lawfulness. Certificate of Lawfulness Approved. Correspondence: email from Sustainable South Hams. Email from SHDC on the proposed South Hams Festival Ash Meadow: General maintenance work parties are proceeding well, although we are getting potential issues coping with the amount of green waste being left on site. Thanks to all volunteers who have attended. Tom Lee and Roger Marsden have shown interest in becoming committee members. The exercise equipment has now been serviced but it is thought we may have a bearing problem which may require further attention on the walker. The new chips are now all in place on the climbing frame. Thanks to Chris and Barbara for completing this. The suggestion that we close the CIC is still under discussion. We have taken our own public liability insurance protection. I was advised that work/ activity/events which were undertaken by the Ash Meadow Committee would not have Public liability protection. I now undertake a weekly check which I record. The long grass, retained for wildlife protection in the orchard area, has been mowed by Nigel and other volunteers and more volunteers are required to help with raking up the grass. Composting area : we have not been able to progress the building of our new concrete barriers for the green waste deposit area. CCTV is being considered. Issue one: As mentioned above we have had a huge amount of green waste deposited in the last two months which I believe was largely from our local contractors depositing waste collected from local gardens. We may have to consider restricting or charging for the use by contractors. Issue two: The very old sleepers holding the shredded compost bays are disintegrating and we may consider replacement. This would be an expensive task and also a considerable challenge. I would like to think, in view of the community benefit and environmental benefit this may be something the Parish Council will consider funding. I estimate it to be in the region of £3500 if we were able to use concrete panels and posts. Activity on the site :Kevan's committee who arranged the Tractor Fest ensured it was a huge success despite wet weather. It is planned again for next year. Over £3000 was raised and donated £800 each to Chernoble Children, the Difib fund and Ukraine Action Charity (they also received other donations on the day including a generator) and £500 to Ashmeadow for which we are extremely grateful. I have sent an email thanking the committee. Bonfire night is being planned, details to follow This is

planned for parish residents only, and may be a bonfire but with BBQs and games for all the family. Finances. Still a healthy situation with a further £3600 being held in the Parish council account which has been donated by SHDC. We also sent £2475 to the parish council which was used for the purchase of the container (owned by the PC) to enable the PC to reclaimVAT. We are working now on funding for replacement of the climbing frame. Other Business/Councillors 'Areas of Responsibility Arrangements for Remembrance Sunday. A green wreath will be supplied by Mike Pearey. The Clerk was asked to provide a wreath for the children of the parish to lay. It was pointed out by Cllr. Greaves that Ashprington has one of the largest turn outs in the South Hams.



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
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
